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- Naval General Service Medal 1848**, clasp Algiers, named to John Jennings. With copy medal roll, information regarding the battle, and two images of HMS Impregnable, which appear to be photographs of paintings made by John Schranz. There are two men of this name on the roll, one being an Able Seaman entitled to the Egypt clasp, and this medal to John Jennings, a Royal Marine aboard HMS Impregnable. *Good very fine* £1,450-1,650
- Boultons Trafalgar Medal in Bronze**. *Near Mint condition* £850-950
- Davidsons Nile Medal** in silver bronze, Good fine £495-595
- Nelson Victories. 4 Gilt Medalettes** circa 1805. £850-950
- Military General Service Medal 1848**, four clasps, Corunna, Salamanca, Orthes, and Toulouse, named to M. Donoghue, 42<sup>nd</sup> Foot. Michael Donoghue, born Kiimain, Cork., Served 20<sup>th</sup> January 1795 to 20<sup>th</sup> August 1802 in Loyal Inverness Fencible Highlanders. Re-enlisted in 42<sup>nd</sup> at Balana, 7<sup>th</sup> September 1806 for 7 years. Joined 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion, stationed at Gibraltar, March 1808, present at Corruna, 16<sup>th</sup> January 1809, Embarked with Battalion for England, 19<sup>th</sup> January 1809. Left sick at Canterbury, and in Hospital when Battalion embarked for Walcheren Expedition, 16<sup>th</sup> July 1809. Rejoined Battalion at Musselburgh on its return to England, 17<sup>th</sup> July 1810. Arrived in Portugal with Battalion, 29<sup>th</sup> April 1812. Left sick at Penasanda, June 1812, but rejoined Battalion for Salamanca 22<sup>nd</sup> July 1812, re-enlisted in March 1813. Sick during December 1813, but rejoined for Orthes 27<sup>th</sup> February 1813, and Toulouse 10<sup>th</sup> April 1814. Returned with Battalion from France, embarking 21<sup>st</sup> June 1814 at Bordeaux. Service with Battalion in Ireland at Kilkenny, until it embarked for Flanders, served with Battalion in Ireland at Kilkenny, until it embarked for Flanders, 9<sup>th</sup> May 1815, when left sick with Depot at Cork. Rejoined Battalion at Edinburgh, on its return from France 8<sup>th</sup> March 1816, and transferred to 3<sup>rd</sup> Royal Veteran Battalion stationed at Edinburgh, which disbanded in May/July 1816. *Nearly extremely fine* £1,800-2,000
- Army of India Medal**, three clasps (all Jewellers copies), Mahidpoor, Gawilghur, and Argaum, privately named to Lieutenant Colonel Josiah Stewart, CB (1781-1839) Madras Staff Corps He was born in 1781 in Langholm, Dumfriesshire, Scotland. He was educated at Edinburgh University, and initially served for a short time as a Midshipman in the Royal Navy prior to his joining the East India Company, arriving as a Cadet in 1800. He accompanied Sir John Malcolm's embassy to Persia in 1805, as first Assistant, and subsequently was Political Officer at the courts of Jaipur, Gwalior and Hyderabad in the Deccan, later being awarded the CB. (July 20th 1838). He lost his right arm and was wounded in the side during an action in the transport 'Teignmouth' against a French Privateer in the Persian Gulf. He was also mentioned in a General Order by the Madras Government on 26 May 1806 for 'conduct highly commended' by the Court of Directors. He married Frances Dean, widow of William Malcolm of Burnfoot, Dumfries, by whom he had two children, William Little and Charlotte, who married Robert Alexander. He died at Cheltenham, aged 58, in 1839. Unfortunately 9 years before the Army of India medal was awarded. £625-700
- Afghanistan Medal 1842**, reverse Candahar, Ghuznee and Cabul 1842, unnamed as issued. *Good very fine* £490-550
- Jellalabad Medal**, unnamed as issued. *Nearly extremely fine* £575-650
- Punjab Medal 1848-49**, two clasps, Goojerat and Chilianwala named to Edmund Potter, 14<sup>th</sup> Light Dragoons. Potter was a confirmed Chelsea Pensioner who died on the 13th January 1892. Potter came from Hounslow in Middlesex and was a shoemaker and joined the British Army on the 6th April 1838 served 18 years and 5 months all of it in India. Also awarded the IGS 1854 Persia clasp and Indian Mutiny medal clasp Central India. Light contact wear, *Very fine* £695-795
- South Africa Medal 1853**, named to Sergeant P. Kilduff, 2<sup>nd</sup> Regiment. With copy papers. Heavy contact wear and bruising, *About fine* £300-350
- Crimea Medal**, clasp Sebastopol, unnamed as issued. Clasp loose on ribbon. *Good very fine* £195-225
- India General Service Medal 1854**, clasp Perak, named to 820 Private G. Hopkins, 80<sup>th</sup> Foot. With copy papers, from Stockport in Cheshire, attested for service on 4<sup>th</sup> August 1860, joining the 13<sup>th</sup> Prince Albert's Light Infantry (Somersetshire), transferring to the 80<sup>th</sup> Regiment (Staffordshire Volunteers) on 28<sup>th</sup> February 1861. Hopkins saw service in China in 1872, before being sent on the expedition to Perak, he later saw service in South Africa, and is additionally entitled to a South Africa Medal, clasp 1878, and an Army Long Service and Good Conduct Medal issued in 1879, as well as a Bhootan clasp for his IGS. *Good very fine* £380-450

13. **India General Service Medal 1854**, clasp Umbeyla named to 338 M. Ford, H.M. 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion, 7<sup>th</sup> Regiment. With copy medal roll, *Good very fine* £275-325
14. **India General Service Medal 1854**, clasp Burma 1885-7 to Colonel Thomas Henry Binny Young, 17<sup>th</sup> Madras Infantry and Madras Staff Corps. Born 19<sup>th</sup> Nov 1841 at Secunderabad, First commissioned 25<sup>th</sup> June 1858 in to 19<sup>th</sup> Native Infantry, Probationary Superintendent of police 1<sup>st</sup> Class at South Arcot, promoted Captain 25<sup>th</sup> June 1870 with the Police at Cuddalore. Promoted Major 25<sup>th</sup> June 1878 Retired pre 1890 as a Colonel Madras Staff Corps. He died 22<sup>nd</sup> May 1920 at Totnes Devon. Married Maria Rebecca Kidd 1<sup>st</sup> March 1870 at Cuddalore, the daughter of the Chaplain of Cuddalore. They had a daughter Mary Christabel born 1871 £400-500
15. **India General Service Medal 1854**, clasp Burma 1887-89 named in running script to Lieutenant T.D. Leslie, 4<sup>th</sup> Cavalry Hyderabad Contingent. Thomas Dowglasse Leslie was commissioned a 2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant in the Royal Fusiliers on 9 September 1882. Appointed to the Madras Staff Corps, June 1885. Appointed a Squadron Officer in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Cavalry Hyderabad Contingent, September 1888. Attached as Officiating Adjutant in the Governor's Bodyguard, May 1889. Captain in the Indian Staff Corps, September 1893. Squadron Officer with the 4<sup>th</sup> Regiment of Lancers, Hyderabad Contingent, August 1894. £350-400
16. **India General Service Medal 1854**, clasp Burma 1887-89 named to 905 Trooper Jital Rao, 4<sup>th</sup> Cavalry, Hyderabad Contingent. Suspender a little slack, *Generally very fine* £140-180
17. **India General Service Medal 1854**, in bronze, clasp Burma 1885-7, named to Jhorawallah Kuttiah, 2<sup>nd</sup> Madras Lancers. Jhorawallah is the rank for a Sweeper. *Generally very fine* £140-170
18. **India General Service Medal 1854**, clasp Hazara 1888 named to 2233 Private P. Roache, 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion, Royal Irish Regiment. Suspender a little slack, *Good very fine* £265-305
19. **India General Service Medal 1854**, clasp Hazara 1891 to Major Horace Robert Francis Anderson, 16<sup>th</sup> Bombay Native Infantry. Born in August 1863 commissioned into the Yorkshire Regt. He transferred to the Lancashire Fusiliers as a Lieutenant in October 1883. Two years later he gained an appointment in the Indian Staff Corps and subsequently served in the Hazara operations of 1891 against the Hazzanzais and Aakasais tribes. He was advanced to Captain in August 1901, he died at sea aboard the S.S.Oriental en route to Aden in August 1903. £350-400
20. **India General Service Medal 1854**, clasp Waziristan 1894-95, named to 877 Sepoy Muhammad Khan, 33<sup>rd</sup> Bengal Infantry. Slack suspender, *Generally very fine* £100-125
21. **Indian Mutiny Medal**, clasp Central India to Lieutenant Colonel Samuel Henry Joseph Partridge, 24<sup>th</sup> Bombay Native Infantry. Entered the HEIC in the 1826 Season becoming Ensign 1827 in the Bombay 18<sup>th</sup> Native Infantry eventually promoted to Major in 1851. He was advanced to Lieutenant Colonel in 1858 and was Commanding the Field Detachment of the Bombay Army during the Mutiny. He died 30<sup>th</sup> June 1860 in Middlesex. £1,100-1,300
22. **Indian Mutiny Medal**, clasp Central India to Major Alexander Davidson, Bombay Engineers. Born on the 6<sup>th</sup> July 1829 in Moradabad, Bengal, the son of Alexander and Mary-Ann Davidson. Accepted as a cadet at Addiscombe for the 1847-48 season, he joined the HEIC Army, appointed 2<sup>nd</sup>. Lieutenant 8<sup>th</sup> December 1848 Bombay Sappers & Miners. Promoted Lieutenant 1<sup>st</sup> August 1854, Captain 27<sup>th</sup> August 1857. During the Mutiny he served with as Field Engineer of the Rajputana Field Force and was mentioned in despatches several times. After the Mutiny promoted Major and was then Lieut-Colonel 10<sup>th</sup> November 1869. On 31<sup>st</sup> December 1878 he was appointed a Major-General. He retired to Weston-Super-Mare. And then to Tunbridge Wells, Kent. He died there in June 1902 aged 72. £800-900
23. **Indian Mutiny Medal** to William Ashton, Brigade Surgeon, 53<sup>rd</sup> Foot (Shropshire). Served in the Mutiny with firstly the 79<sup>th</sup> Highlanders at the storing of Rempore Kussia and then with the 53<sup>rd</sup> Foot at the General Hospital at Calcutta. Promoted Staff Surgeon 1860, transferred to the Royal Artillery 1864 and appointed Surgeon Major on the Staff 1872, Brigade Surgeon 1888, died 1904. *Good very fine* £750-900
24. **India Mutiny Medal**, clasp Central India name to Michael Boyle, 3<sup>rd</sup> Madras European Regiment. *Good very fine* £700-800
25. **Indian Mutiny Medal** to Colonel Charles Lopes Periera, Nagpore Irregular Forces. Born at Neemuch 12<sup>th</sup>. November 1829 the son of Captain Isaac Pereira Bengal Artillery. In 1857 appointed 2<sup>nd</sup>. In Command of the 1<sup>st</sup>. Nagpore Irregular Force and commanded the Rifle Company which was employed in Jubbulpore 1857-58. Appointed Superintendent of Police Raepoor 1861, Wing Officer 24<sup>th</sup>. Native Infantry 1868 and retired 1875 as a Colonel. Died at Christchurch 1885 aged 55. £600-700
26. **Indian Mutiny Medal** to Captain Thomas Pattison Wood, 29<sup>th</sup> Foot. Born in Bermuda 31<sup>st</sup>.March 1833, recommended by the Governor of Bermuda for a commission to General Lord Fitzroy Somerset and after eventually passing the entrance exam he was able to purchase a position as an Ensign in the 81<sup>st</sup>. Foot in 1852, serving in the East Indies he again purchased a Lieutenantancy in 1854. Transferring to the 29<sup>th</sup> Foot in 1855 and served in Burma until 1857 when he returned to India where he remained until 1858. During the Mutiny he commanded a small detachment of the 29<sup>th</sup> Foot under the Command of Captain the Hon.E.G.Curzon of the 52<sup>nd</sup> Foot against the Dacca mutineers at Churrabunda Bhutan. Returning home in 1858 he was put on depot duties and purchased a Captaincy in 1860, retiring by sale of commission in 1862. He died at Tonbridge Wells in 1874. £500-600
27. **Indian Mutiny Medal**, clasp Lucknow, named to Bugler Jas. Willis, 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion, Rifle Brigade. With photocopied service papers, which confirms his appointment as Bugler. Some contact wear to rim, *Generally very fine* £400-450
28. **Indian Mutiny Medal**, clasp Lucknow, named to Hy Jenkins, 97<sup>th</sup> Foot. Henry Jenkins, with copy medal roll, confirming entitlement to Lucknow clasp. Medal has been made into a menu holder, please see website photographs. Some contact wear, and edge-bruising, *Very fine* £300-350

29. **Indian Mutiny Medal**, no bar, awarded Charles Johnson, Captain 'A' Company, 4<sup>th</sup> Madras Artillery. Served with major General Whitlock's division throughout his campaign. Returned to England in November 1865, served 14 years in total, educate at Addiscombe. £400-500
30. **Indian Mutiny Medal**, clasp Central India named to P. Mahony, 86<sup>th</sup> Regiment. Suspender loose, needs re-pinning (you can currently slide it around the disc). *Generally very fine* £400-450
31. **Indian Mutiny Medal**, clasp Central India named to Robert Eirwan, 83<sup>rd</sup> Regiment. Suspender loose, needs re-pinning (you can currently slide it around the disc). *Generally very fine* £400-450
32. **Indian Mutiny Medal**, no clasp, named to Wm H. Swan, 80<sup>th</sup> Regiment. With copy Medal Roll transcription from Find My Past, William H. Swan, transferred to Indian Army 31<sup>st</sup> May 1860. *Good very fine* £250-300
33. **Indian Mutiny Medal**, no clasp, named to Frederick Noak, 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion, 20<sup>th</sup> Regiment. 20<sup>th</sup> Regiment (East Devonshire), stationed at Gorakhpur in 1861. *Good very fine* £225-275
34. **Indian Mutiny Medal**, no clasp, named in a locally period engraved style to George McGill, Farrier, E Troop, 4<sup>th</sup> Madras Light Cavalry. Some small contact wear to rim, *Generally very fine* £225-250
35. **Indian Mutiny Medal**, no clasp, named to C. Ward, 3<sup>rd</sup> Madras European Regiment. *Good very fine* £200-250
36. **New Zealand Medal**, reverse undated, named to 3571 Private P. Gilligan, 65<sup>th</sup> Foot. A late claim medal. With copy medal roll, and mentioned in the history 'The melee in the swamp had been a succession of desperate hand to hand encounters, and many instances of courage were exhibited on both side. Private Gilligan, 65<sup>th</sup>, shot one Waikato, and brained another with the butt end of his rifle. Many other daring acts were witnessed, but must remain unrecorded as the individuals could not be identified. But the bayonet played a conspicuous part in the exciting scene.' *Nearly extremely fine* £550-650
37. **New Zealand Medal**, reverse 1863 to 1866 named to 338 Wm Notley, 50<sup>th</sup> Queens Own Regiment. With copy discharge papers, never tried by court martial, but once appeared in the Regimental Defaulters book. *Nearly extremely fine* £500-550
38. **New Zealand Medal**, reverse dated 1864-66 named to 3565 George McCann, 68<sup>th</sup> Light Infantry. With copy discharge papers, some contacting to rim. *Generally very fine* £450-500
39. **Canada General Service Medal**, clasp Fenian Raid 1866, named to 1428 Private J. Delaney, 4<sup>th</sup> Rifle Brigade. Only 175 such medals to the Regiment, unresearched. *Nearly extremely fine* £460-500
40. **Ashantee Medal**, clasp Coomassie named to 1420 Private J. Edwards, 42<sup>nd</sup> Highlanders 1873-74. With research and copy service papers. Born in Old Machar, Aberdeen he was a serving Gunner in the Forfar and Kincardine Artillery Volunteers he attested for the Black Watch at Aberdeen 18<sup>th</sup> September 1865. An habitual offender he was tried and imprisoned for being drunk in January 1867, went absent without leave from 22<sup>nd</sup> May 1867 until 18<sup>th</sup> June 1867. Tried for desertion he was imprisoned 28<sup>th</sup> June 1867 to 19<sup>th</sup> September 1867. Two further episodes of being absent without leave for 3 and 2 days are recorded in 1874. Taking part in the Ashantee Campaign 1873-4 he was slightly wounded in action, left arm at Amoaful, 31<sup>st</sup> January 1874. A scarce casualty medal for this campaign. *Nearly extremely fine* £600-700
41. **Ashantee Medal 1873**, no clasp, named to J. Connolly, Engineer, Royal Navy, HMS Seagull 73-4. With record sheet and medal roll, 90 medals to this ship. Joseph Connolly entered the Royal Navy 27<sup>th</sup> November 1860 as an Assistant Engineer 3<sup>rd</sup> Class from Private Trade (presumably the Merchant Navy). 2<sup>nd</sup> Class Assistant Engineer 16<sup>th</sup> April 1861, 1<sup>st</sup> Class Assistant Engineer 25<sup>th</sup> July 1864 and Engineer (Lieutenant) 17<sup>th</sup> October 1867. Connolly joined HMS Seagull 1<sup>st</sup> January 1873, HMS Indus 15<sup>th</sup> October 1875, HMS Valiant 8<sup>th</sup> March 1876, HMS Seagull 7<sup>th</sup> March 1878, HMS Amelia 18<sup>th</sup> February 1879 and retired 7<sup>th</sup> February 1882 having reached the age limit and not qualified for promotion. Awarded a pension of £103 a year. HMS Seagull was a Wood Screw Gunboat, a total of 90 medals to the ship. *Extremely fine* £360-400
42. **Ashantee Medal 1873-74**, named to A.J. Granville, Ships Cook, HMS Simoom 1873-74. *Generally very fine* £300-350
43. **Ashantee Medal 1873-74**, no clasp, named to W.G.H. Webber, Domestic 2<sup>nd</sup> Class, HMS Rattlesnake. Traces of broach marks, otherwise *Very fine* £260-300
44. **Afghanistan Medal 1878**, no clasp, named to Captain C.J. Whitaker, 65<sup>th</sup> Foot. Whitaker was born in Valetta, Malta on December 22<sup>nd</sup> 1849. Ensign C.J. Whitaker joined the Regiment in 1869 and was the last to purchase promotion to Lieutenant as the system was abolished in 1871 and served in Agra, India as Lieutenant and Adjutant during 1873. During 1878 officers, including Captain Whitaker and 22 other ranks were posted to the Kurrum Field Force on signals and communications duties in Afghanistan. Captain Whitaker was appointed Superintendent Army Signalling to the Kurrum Vallery Field Force. There were only 28 medals to the Regiment. This was to be Colonel Whitakers only medal although he did go on to command the Battalion in 1894, retiring in 1897 a full Colonel. With research including a photocopy of a picture of Officers of the 65<sup>th</sup> at Agra in 1873 in which Whitaker is identified, and another of Whitaker in uniform. *Nearly extremely fine* £525-575
45. **Afghanistan Medal 1878**, no clasp, named to Mr. S. Smith, Punjab Police Department. With research. Sydney Smith appointed July 1870 as Assistant District Superintendent in the Punjab Police. Served in Afghanistan 1878-80 and had the medal with no bar. At this time he was a District Supt IV Grade at Derra Gaza Khan. Was at Mooltan in 1886 and by 1893 was Supt Grade III at Lahore. Assistant Inspector General Railway Police, Lahore May 1900, Deputy Inspector General of Police November 1901. Awarded medal for Delhi Durbar 1903. Retired August 1905. *Nearly extremely fine* £425-500

46. **Afghanistan Medal 1878**, no clasp, named to 1186 Private A. Storrie, 92<sup>nd</sup> Highlanders. Edge bruise at 9 o'clock to reverse rim, otherwise, *Nearly extremely fine* £200-250
47. **Afghanistan Medal 1878**, no clasp, named to 32B/238 Private W. Webb, 1<sup>st</sup>/12<sup>th</sup> Regiment. *Good very fine* £200-250
48. **Afghanistan Medal 1878**, no clasp, named to 591 Private M. Doyle, 1/25<sup>th</sup> Foot. *Nearly extremely fine* £190-220
49. **Afghanistan Medal, 1878**, no clasp, named to 1084 Private T. O'Connor, 1/25<sup>th</sup> Foot. (King's Own Scottish Borderers.) *Good very fine* £170-210
50. **Afghanistan Medal 1878-80**, no clasp named to Sowar (Trooper) Suntok Singh, 3<sup>rd</sup> Bengal Cavalry. Scarce to Regiment. £125-150
51. **South Africa Medal 1879**, clasp 1878-9 named to 2012 Private J. Shea, 1/13<sup>th</sup> Foot. With muster rolls and research, showing that Shea was present with his regiment at Ulundi. This is the rarest of the clasps for this medal, with only 1,180 to British Troops. *Good very fine* £580-650
52. **South Africa Medal 1877-79**, disc only, named to 3348 Private W. Saunders, Army Hospital Corps. Evidence of broaching, numerous contact edges, thus *Poor* £80-100
53. **Egypt Medal**, dated reverse, three clasps, Tel-El-Kebir, Suakin 1884 and El-Teb\_Tamaai named to 1111 Private P. Keegan, 1<sup>st</sup> Gordon Highlanders. With research, Keegan was regularly imprisoned during his service usually for Drunkenness, from Kildare, Ireland, he enlisted in the British Army, 8<sup>th</sup> December 1862, discharged 29<sup>th</sup> December 1885. Some light pitting, presumably from a Khedives Star, thus *Generally very fine* £475-550
54. **Egypt Medal 1882**, undated reverse, two clasps Suakin 1885 and Tofrek named to D. Taylor, Private, Royal Marine Light Infantry. Private David Taylor, wounded in action at Tofrek on 22<sup>nd</sup> March 1885, gunshot through the left thigh, invalidated from the service in January 1887. With paperwork. Served HMS Duke of Wellington, October 1877-September 1879, HMS Asia, October 1880-January 1881, HMS Duke of Wellington October 1881 to September 1883, HMS Thunderer, September 1884 to April 1885. Royal Marine Battalion October 1884 to April 1885. Imprisoned 3 times including onboard Duke of Wellington for 14 days in August 1879. At Tofrek 7 Marines were killed and 16 wounded including Taylor. *Good very fine* £350-400
55. **Egypt Medal**, undated reverse, clasp Gemaizah 1888, named to 554 Private I. Patterson, 2<sup>nd</sup> Kings Own Scottish Borderers. With copy medal roll, noted as having Died by the previous owner. *Nearly extremely fine* £330-370
56. **Egypt Medal**, dated 1882 reverse, clasp Tel-El-Kebir named to 2385 Private J. Brennan, 4<sup>th</sup> Dragoon Guards, with copy medal roll, and some information regarding the 4<sup>th</sup> Dragoon Guards roll in the Egyptian Campaign. *Nearly extremely fine* £225-275
57. **Egypt Medal**, dated reverse, clasp Suakin 1885, named to J.J. Kingdon, Able Seaman, HMS "Agincourt". From Devonport, born 28<sup>th</sup> January 1858, with copy papers. *Good very fine* £210-250
58. **Egypt Medal**, undated reverse, clasp The Nile 1884-85 named to 4459 Private W. Morrison, 11<sup>th</sup> Company, Commissariat and Transport Corps. With copy medal roll. *Good very fine* £200-225
59. **Egypt Medal**, undated reverse, clasp Suakin 1885 named to 5027 Private J. Brough, 2<sup>nd</sup> Scots Guards. Some edge-knicks, naming very clear, *Generally very fine* £200-225
60. **Egypt Medal**, dated 1882 reverse, no clasp, named to 2558 Private W. Bartlett, 7<sup>th</sup> Dragoon Guards. With copy service papers, Walter Bartlett was from Chard in Somerset, he was discharged due to Dementia, after attempting to desert whilst awaiting court-martial. The Dementia not being caused by his service, but due to his 'in-temperance'. *Good very fine* £200-225
61. **Egypt Medal**, dated 1882 reverse, clasp Suakin 1885, named to 41/2118 Private J. Lyford, 1<sup>st</sup> Berkshire Regiment. With copy medal roll. A little contact wear to the Regiment, but still readable. *Generally very fine* £190-220
62. **Egypt Medal**, dated 1882 reverse, no clasp, named to 1298 Private C. Yarwood, 1<sup>st</sup> Royal Sussex Regiment. Some pitting, and a little contact wear at 3 o'clock and 9 o'clock, otherwise *Generally very fine* £150-180

Hugh was educated at Cheltenham College; Trinity College, Stratford on Avon; and Manchester University, where he graduated as a M.B. on 5th July, 1913. On the outbreak of War, he volunteer for active service and was commissioned as a Temporary Lieutenant on 10th August, 1914. Lieutenant Willis was initially posted to the 13th Stationary Hospital at Boulogne and then the No2 Ambulance Train. He was later transferred to the 3rd Battalion, Worcestershire Regiment as the Battalion's Medical Officer. Captain Willis was mortally wounded on Westhoek Ridge, near Ypres, Belgium on 11th August, 1917, dying the following day. During 1919, James was the Officer Commanding of the Indian Station

Hospital, Abbottabad, India. He was promoted to Colonel on 25th October, 1922 and made an Honorary Physician to the King on 19th December, 1923. Reverting to Military employment on 7th November, 1924, Colonel McDonald retired two years later on 7th November, 1926. In 1926, James Haldane McDonald served as a Mercantile Marine Surgeon on board the Motor Vessel Upway Grange. Between, 1929 and 1931, he lived at Brunswick Road, Sutton with his wife Rosina. During 1940, he was living at 40 Pembury Grove, Sidley, Bexhill on Sea, East Sussex. James Haldane McDonald died on 30th September, 1940 at the Orchard House Nursing Home, Burnt Wood, Battle, East Sussex. Awarded the Order of the Crown of Italy in 1938. He was President of the London Fencing Club, his pupils did very well including Gwen Neligan amongst others, he published his fencing techniques and methods. Retired from coaching in 1977 (!) due to illness. He died in 1980. Strangely on 9 June 2014, Great Britain's James Davis won gold at the 2014 European Championships in Strasbourg, France. In doing so, Davis officially becomes the first ever Brit to win a European Championship. Ocean when it struck a mine and sunk during the attempt to force the Dardanelles on 18th March, 1915. After this, he transferred to the cruiser H.M.S. Europa operating in the Dardanelles Campaign. He was transferred to the cruiser H.M.S. Minerva on the 21st July, 1915 seeing action off the Gallipoli Peninsular. He remained with H.M.S. Minerva until 31st December, 1917, seeing service on the China Station; in the Indian Ocean and the Red Sea. The rest of his war was spent at H.M.S. Vivid. After the First World War, he served on board the Battleship H.M.S. Revenge; the Destroyer H.M.S. Satyr; the Light Cruiser H.M.S. Centaur; the Light Cruiser H.M.S. Durban and the Torpedo School H.M.S. Defiance. Yeoman Signaller Martin was awarded the Naval Long Service and Good Conduct on 31st October, 1921. Chief Yeoman Signaller Martin was discharged to pension on 17th May, 1926 and transferred to the Royal Fleet Reserve. Alfred married Ada Priscilla Willis in Kingston, Surrey during 1933. Incoming Passenger lists during the early 1930s show Alfred Martin employed as a Civil Servant/Wharfinger arriving from Lagos, Nigeria. His home address is shown in 92 Bushy Park Road, Teddington, Middlesex. Although he was discharged from the Royal Fleet Reserve in 1935, Alfred was back in uniform for the Second World War serving at H.M.S. Drake and on board H.M.S. The entry additionally states that he was held at Java, Singapore, Borneo (Jesselton, Sandakan) and probably died at Sandakan. 153 MU was an Engine Repair Depot and was based at Singapore until moving to Java in January 1942. The book 'Sandakan: A Conspiracy of Silence' by Lynette Ramsay Silver tells the story of the Sandakan prisoner of war camp during the closing years of World War II. Of the 1793 Australian and 641 British servicemen held in the North Borneo camp and its surrounds, only six Australians survived. The Australians and British in the camp were mostly those captured by the Japanese during the fall of Singapore. The book details their last days of freedom in Singapore, their captivity, transfer to North Borneo and the appalling conditions in the camp, where they were forced to labour, day and day out, while being provided with little food. The Allies were aware of the location of these prisoners and the conditions under which they were suffering. A plan was put together towards the end of the war to rescue them, as it was known that the Japanese were eliminating prisoners of war as they were forced to retreat. Donald was Wounded in Action during the Battle of Mount Sorrel, Ypres, on the 3rd June, 1916, receiving a shrapnel wound to his left knee and left wrist, and was admitted to the 3rd Canadian General Hospital at Boulogne. Donald was promoted to Sergeant on 22nd November, 1916 and acting Company Sergeant Major on 3rd February, 1917. 110137 C.S.M. Dixon, 5th Canadian Mounted Rifles was commissioned as a Temporary Lieutenant on 2nd September, 1917, re-joining the 5th Canadian Mounted Rifles in the field on 22nd November, 1917. Lieutenant Dixon was awarded the Military Cross for bravery at Bouchouir, near Amiens, on 9th August, 1918. The award was announced in General Sir H.S. Rawlinson, 4th Army list of immediate awards of the 13th October, 1918. (London Gazette citation - 11th January, 1919 - This officer displayed great skill in leading his men during the attack and capture of a village. At one point of the advance his company was held up by heavy machine gun fire. He quickly grasped the situation, outflanked and captured the machine gunners and continued the advance with slight casualties. His splendid example and coolness during the whole operation were very marked.) The Military Cross was presented to Donald, by King George V, at Buckingham Palace, London, on 10th July, 1919. Donald married Mary Ethel Richardson at St Anne's Church, Wandsworth, London, on 30th August, 1919. Having served in England and France with the 5th Canadian Mounted Rifles, including brief periods with the 1st Quebec Regiment and 23rd (Reserve) Battalion, he was struck off strength on the 3rd November, 1919 by reason of General Demobilization and allowed to take up residence in the British Isles. Shadow V was moored in the harbour at Mullaghmore IRA member Thomas McMahon had slipped onto the unguarded boat at night and attached a radio controlled bomb .The bomb was detonated the boat was just a few hundred yards from the shore the boat was destroyed Mountbatten's legs were almost blown off he was aged 79 and was pulled alive from the water by fisherman but died from his injuries before being brought to shore. Also killed were his grandson Nicholas aged 14 also Paul Maxwell a young crew member and Doreen Lady Brabourne aged 83 died of her injuries the following day.The IRA claimed responsibility for the execution of Mountbatten. On the 5th September 1979 Mountbatten received a ceremonial funeral at Westminster Abbey which was attended by the Queen Mountbatten was buried in Romsey Abbey.
